JOURNEY IN HOLINESS

Greetings St Barnabas Family

'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' (Matthew 22:37-39.)

Our way of life - loving God and loving others - could be called a 'Journey in Holiness'. I have named the Lent Studies that (our focus is on the 7 deadly sins, and 7 heavenly virtues). I wondered about calling it a 'Journey to Holiness', but that suggested that holiness was a destination. Perhaps holiness is a destination, but it is also a process and a way of living that grows holiness within us and demonstrates holiness to those around us. The word 'in' suggests that holiness is already present, within us and around us, and we journey in that, going deeper in relationship with God and with others on the way. Our Journey in Holiness will continue beyond Lent, following where God leads us.

Since arriving at St Barnabas in September 2019, I have been learning about the parish and who is who and how this wonderful community operates. It is a privilege to be here, and I am enjoying meeting with you as I work through the parish list arranging visits and many cups of tea/water/coffee/wine (depending on the occasion and the time of day!). There are many strengths in this parish and I am very impressed with the hospitality, the commitment to music and liturgy, the way you care for one another and the way you

take responsibility for your roles in the parish (agreeing to do something and actually doing it!). I hope that together we can continue to strengthen these.

Highlights since September have included – having Bishop Ellie with us, going with Ben to Ohakune for Synod, Community Carols led wonderfully by Steph and Mark, Christmas Mass (midnight and Christmas Day) including Christmas Lunch, two weddings in January and preparing for four more, the retreat weekend to Hiruharama and so many more.

For 2020, I hope to:

- encourage vestry to continue their great work in leading this parish so well:
- continue with pastoral visiting and praying with people;
- work with others in the parish to coordinate pastoral care, so that it can continue to be a strength of our community;

- support our children's ministry leader as she begins her role, and encourage the children on to youth group at All Saints when they are old enough
- encourage discipleship within the parish – moving from the Lent study to something further after Easter. Encourage newer members of the parish to be part of
- this, to go deeper with God, and grow relationships with others in the parish.
- encourage all in the parish to continue to use their gifts and talents in and outside our community.

In our Eastern Suburbs Church cluster (led by Mark Johnson from St Thomas' Newtown) this term we are working on strengths, weaknesses,

opportunities and threats, in the context of our own mission units/parishes. I look forward to thinking

and praying about those things for our St Barnabas community.

PEOPLE'S WARDEN'S ANNUAL REPORT

The 2019 year began very positively with the St Barnabas Parish Meeting. A day set aside to set parish goals. From the goals a Parish Profile was developed. The Profile guided the publication of an updated advertisement for a new parish priest.

The monthly publication of the Parish Bulletin by Cathy Downes has so much improved the communication within the Parish, and is hugely popular.

Father David Tannock took responsibility for the pastoral leadership at St Barnabas from May until August, while we were without a priest. The leadership for services was also shared between Father Derek Lightbourne, Pippa Christmas and Michael Doherty.

In June a Parish Retreat Day, led by Joy Cowley, entitled "The Potter and the Clay" was held.

St Barnabas parishioners were heavily involved in the planning of the Anglo Catholic Hui in August. Hosting meals, participating in the choir and offering hospitality to visitors helped make the event a real success.

August was devoted to the process of selecting a new priest. In early September it was a delight to have the Rev Cath Growcott installed as our priest.

Throughout October and November meetings were held to discuss a way forward for Children's Ministry within the Parish. In February, 2020 we were pleased to appoint Olivia Knox, a young woman associated with All Saints, Hataitai to the position of Children's Ministry Leader.

The above is an outline of the "exceptional" milestones that have occurred at St Barnabas over the past year. Below is a list of what happens routinely at St Barnabas on an ongoing basis:

PROPERTY REPORT

After a very busy 2018 in the property portfolio for St Barnabas, 2019 seemed to be have been relatively pedestrian. We had issues with the heating towards the end of the year thanks largely to rodent residents of the hill. While the heating unit has been fixed we are still seeking a long term solution to the cause. This will include a combination of physical barriers and life shortening paraphernalia.

Congratulations to the St Barnabas community on your perfor-

mance in the fire drill recently and thanks to Michael for facilitating it. There is an ever increasing need for the community to meet health and safety requirements that are part of the diocesan policy and process manual. While this may seem onerous to some and box ticking to others it is important for us to keep our community, visitors and contractors safe! We appreciate your support is identifying issues and bringing maintenance matters to our attention.

Apart from the need for background maintenance on the church, lounge and vicarage to preserve the assets the main issue looming in the building portfolio is the vicarage driveway and retain-

ing wall supporting it along the fence line. We will advise when we have a costed plan in place and appreciate your support and patience as we get this work done.

TREASURER'S REPORT

From a financial point of view, 2019 was a very satisfactory year at St Barnabas. With the roof expenditure of 2018 behind us and no priest in charge for some of the time, we were able to build up cash reserves.

There are many people at St Barnabas who give generously and sacrificially and it has been great to have new people sign up to give regularly. If you want to set up a regular payment the bank details are on the weekly bulletin.

The 2019 Statement of Financial Performance (showing the difference between what was given or earned and the expenses we incurred), for the first time in my memory we obtained a surplus after depreciation.


In terms of Parish's Balance sheet, (the resources at St. Barnabas' disposal and any debts it has), the biggest resource we have are the land and buildings which were revalued in 2006. We are awaiting direction from the Diocese as to when these should be revalued, but even at 2006 values they are extremely valuable.


Cash is the next most significant resource. The \$20,000 Maintenance is set aside for major projects such as work on the driveway. The non-profit organisation account contains monies bequested to St Barnabas and will be used when a significant project comes along. Since year end Vestry has put \$40,000 on term deposit.


The Vicarage is one of the resources that contributes a surplus for general use but there are certain expenses which have first call on the funds.
